### LOCALLY-LED DEVELOPMENT: WHAT IS THE VISION AND HOW DO WE GET THERE?

### 1000 - 1100

In the first session of the SWIDN Annual Conference, we will hear from three leaders in our sector as they share their roadmap for how the UK's international development sector can move more effectively and equitably towards a practice of solidarity that is locally-led. This panel will address decolonisation in practice, what aid as reparations might look like, and how UK organisations can learn from local activism to improve impact. There will be time for Q&A after short panel presentations and an opportunity to connect with peers.



### PRIYA LUKKA, UNIVERSITY OF LEEDS

<u>Priya Lukka</u> is an economist in international development working globally to understand alternative realities and perspectives to neoliberalism through raising awareness of communities working for repair and reparations, which is also the focus of her PhD enquiry. Priya has most recently worked as Macroeconomist, covering the region of Asia, at the Office of the High Commissioner for Human Rights at the United Nations, and as Chief Development Economist for Christian Aid.



### **DESIREE ACHOLA, UNIVERSITY OF EXETER**

Desiree has over 15 years of experience at non-profit and international development organizations in North America, Africa, and Europe. She focuses on education, global public health, and cultural & ethnic diversity. Having worked with both small and large organizations, Desiree has been responsible for strategic planning, program implementation, organizational management, communications, research, and policy analysis across a variety of different sectors.



### EDWARD MUTEBI, LETS WALK UGANDA

Edward Mutebi is a human rights activist and the founder and executive director of Let's Walk Uganda. He is a founding member of both PenBerlin and Queer Nothilfe Uganda. With a master's degree in social work and human rights, Edward is committed to advancing equality and justice for marginalised groups of people, with a special interest in academic research on human rights violations that are barely researched or given much attention in the academic arena.

## WHOSE CHANGE IS IT? LOCAL GOALS FOR GLOBAL SOLIDARITY

### 1130 - 1230

In the second panel discussion of this year's conference, we will hear from three experts on their perspectives of what local goals look like, and if and how they differ from global goals, such as the SDGs. The SDGs are widely criticised for locating accountability with donor governments instead of local communities. Can our sector shift this location of power and, if so, how? What do local goals for tackling povertry and inequality look like? There will be time for Q&A after short panel presentations and an opportunity to connect with peers.



### **GILDE TAHINDRAZA, BLUE VENTURES**

Gilde's area of interest and specialisation is community based marine resource management, having worked for Blue Ventures since 2016 supporting coastal communities in South west Madagascar to rebuild their fisheries. His experience includes working on organisational and governance aspects of supporting smallscale fisheries. As an ethnic Vezo, Gilde has a strong understanding and knowledge of the lifestyles and social structure of the Vezo fishing communities that Blue Ventures supports and is passionate about marine conservation.



### WARADAS THIYAGARAJA, UNIVERSITY OF BATH

Waradas is a peace and conflict studies scholar with particular focus on the intersection between sexual and gender justice movements and identities and armed conflict and post-war transitions. His research work includes conflict negotiations, peacebuilding and queering transitional justice in Sri Lanka. He spends time organizing marginalized segments of the LGBTIQA+ communities in Sri Lanka to decentralize the sexual and gender justice landscape. Waradas is also a professional language interpreter in Sinhala, Tamil and English.



### GRACE MAINGI, KENYA COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT FOUNDATION

Grace is a highly regarded leader in Kenya's development sector, with a wealth of experience in driving locally-led initiatives that prioritise community empowerment and sustainable change. Under her leadership, KCDF has been instrumental in promoting inclusive development through locally owned strategies that address key areas such as education, livelihoods, governance and environmental sustainability. Grace's passion for ensuring that development goals reflect local realities and aspirations aligns perfectly with the theme of 'Whose goals, are they? Locally led visions for justice beyond the SDGs'.

## HOW TO DIVERSIFY YOUR BOARD

### 1300 - 1400

In the training session of this year's SWIDN Annual Conference we will hear from Sophia Moreau on practical tips to diversify your board of trustees. The Charity Governance Code calls for board diversity to create more balanced decision-making and to centre and include the people charities serve, not just to improve impact but also to improve legitimacy. In this 1-hour training session, expert consultant Sophia Moreau will take us through practical steps to diversify charity boards with tips that also apply to diversifying teams in organisations beyond charities.



### **SOPHIA MOREAU**

Sophia Moreau is a multi-award-winning diversity, equity, and inclusion consultant and charity leader. She was named the Burberry British Diversity Awards 'Campaigner of the Year' 2022, and one of Charity Times 'Leaders to watch in 2023'.

Drawing on 12 years experience in DEI and her own lived experience of discrimination, Sophia works directly with organisations to tackle inequality and ensure everyone has a seat at the table. She recently authored Getting on Board's practical guide on 'How to diversify your charity board'. Sophia provides advice, auditing, coaching and training to build inclusive workplaces, leadership teams and boards. She regularly acts as an employment law coach and a traumainformed mediator. Outside of work, Sophia is completing a masters in Law.

### LEARNING FROM SWIDN MEMBERS: PRACTICAL EXAMPLES OF CHANGE TOWARDS LOCALLY LED DEVELOPMENT

In the first Working Group session, we will hear from SWIDN members on practical changes they have taken to move towards locally-led development. How do we move away from 'locally led development' as just a buzzword and start to effectively change the balance of power in our work to end global poverty and injustice? We hear examples from across the South West, with opportunity to learn from peers and connect together.



### CHERIO ONACHA AND LUCY JAMES, CHILD.ORG

Cherio Onacha is <u>Child.org</u>'s Programmes Manager. She oversees the implementation of a groundbreaking maternal and neonatal health program which leverages community group support to improve the health outcomes for women and their newborns. Cherio has a decade of experience as a Public Health Professional in International and National NGOs, and is particularly passionate about advancing women's health and bridging gaps in healthcare access. Cherio also holds a Bachelor's in Nutrition and is currently pursuing a Master's in Public Health.



Lucy James is the Income Manager for <u>Child.org</u> and leads the charity's fundraising operation. Lucy has worked in the International Development sector for 8 years, specialising in helping INGOs to develop their income, profile and reach. Lucy also holds an MA in Conflict, Security and Development, where her research focused on critical investigation of impact-based funding mechanisms.



### TOM WILLIAMS OBE, STAND (FORMALLY LEGS4AFRICA)

Tom Williams is the founder of STAND, an organisation born from a lifechanging experience in The Gambia. During a trip to the country, Tom met a family whose father had lost his leg due to diabetes. Through some fortunate events, he was able to secure a prosthetic leg for his new friend. This act of kindness sparked a journey that has since led to the rescue and redistribution of over 18,000 prosthetic legs to those in need across Africa. His commitment is to making mobility accessible to all continues to drive STAND's mission forward.

### MIKE PEARSON, DEVELOPMENT INITIATIVES

Mike is currently a Senior Policy Analyst at Development Initiatives, and has worked in various analysis and programme management roles in the humanitarian and development sectors. Most recently, he worked for the Government of Denmark at their Representative Office in Ramallah, as well as UNICEF (Global Child Protection Area of Responsibility), Plan International and Street Child across a range of contexts. Mike has also worked as a consultant for various NGOs, such as Save the Children and the Norwegian Refugee Council, and also set up a website focusing on humanitarian funding (<u>Humanitarian Funding Forecast</u>).



### DR NILA JACKSON AND SHAENNA LOUGHNANE, BRIDGE2AID

Nila has been Bridge2Aid's strategic partner in Tanzania for a number of years and is now a Trustee of theo rganisation. He is supporting the work of The Ministry of Health to eradicate the practices of Infant Oral Mutilation in the country. He has managed the IOM education workshops since 2021.Nila is a dentist and owns and runs The Sibaba Dental Clinic. He has worked in the role of Regional Medical Officer in Mara, and is on the Management Committee of the Tanzania Dental Association.



Shaenna first started working with Bridge2Aid as a volunteer in 2006, and joined the team in 2011. She is now their CEO working on a part-time basis, with the rest of her time split between being a Freelance Consultant for small charities, being the Chair of Trustees for a small UK-based community charity and being on the Interim Advisory Board for the Royal College of Surgeons of Edinburgh's faculty for Remote, Rural and Humanitarian Healthcare. Prior to working with Bridge2Aid she co-owned and managed 2 large dental practices in Gloucestershire.

### A DIFFERENT IMAGE FOR STORYTELLING: ONLINE NETWORKING

### 1630 - 1730

In the second Working Group and final session of this year's annual conference, we'll meet for an informal networking session structured around discussions of imagery in our sector. Can the stories we tell and the images we use ever be separated from the colonial history of development? Is there a way to 'make' instead of 'take' images that can be locally-led? We're delighted to be able to show some of the art work of photographer Angèle Etoundi Assamba, whose art focuses on challenging stereotypes and representations. The images we will view come from Angèle's 'Africa' exhibit.

This session will be structured around connecting with peers. After viewing Angèle's work, we'll join breakout rooms for informal discussion themed around areas of work.



### ANGÈLE ETOUNDI ASSAMBA

Angèle Etoundi Essamba is a committed artist involved in a reflection on the identity of the black woman.

"The Black woman is at the heart of my artistic expression. She remains an inexhaustible source of inspiration, she is the bearer, the guardian and the transmitter and I celebrate her naturally."

"My work challenges and breaks with stereotypical representations of Black women who are often depicted by western media as submissive, passive, dependent, exotic, and confined to certain roles.

"Instead, I use the camera to reappropriate the Black body and to deconstruct and break these stereotypes by showing active, proud, and determined women who take up daily challenges, show their place and their role in society, take charge of their own narrative and rewrite history."

Essamba's work lies at the intersection of the social/gender and the artistic field. She uses photography to bring her message across in a creative way.Her varied background (Cameroon, France, the Netherlands) and various travels have not only profoundly shaped her eye, but also mean her vision is simultaneously aesthetic, idealistic, realistic, and societal.

Keywords for Essamba's work are pride, strength and awareness.

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


